Ferndown Neighbourhood Policing Team Report

General:

Welcome to our July Report. As you may be aware there have been some changes to our Neighbourhood Policing Teams since the introductions of Police Community Support Investigators (PCSI's) earlier in the year. Within Ferndown NPT both Cheryl and Kate have moved on to this new role and Steve has moved on to pastures new outside the force.

As part of the changes PC Steve Knight has returned from Christchurch to head up the Ferndown NPT, along with PCSO Laura Whalley. The West Moors, Ashley Heath and St Leonards / St Ives Area have been incorporated into the Ferndown NPT Patch along with PCSO James Marsh who covered these areas from Verwood Police Station. PCSO Adam Fitzwalter has remained stationed at Verwood but will provide support to all teams on the Eastern Section.

The New Ferndown NPT team is now based at Ferndown Police Station with a satellite office at Pear Tree on the Ferndown Industrial Estate, which has been provided as part of the Ferndown Bid.

The Team has been hard at work getting out into the community to engage with residents and local businesses. We are setting up drop in sessions at St Marys Church and Marks and Spencer's in the Ferndown area to allow people to come and meet a member of the team to discuss issues in their areas. We will also be looking to roll out the same across the rest of the patch including West Moors in the near future.



We would like to promote and ask people to spread the word of a new service from Dorset Police called Ask NED the Non-Emergency Directory, Ask NED can be found through the Dorset Police Website and can provide answers to commonly asked questions and what actions they can take, as well as signposting people to the correct Partner Agency when their enquiry is not something that can be dealt with by Dorset Police.

Recent Notable Crimes:

The Ferndown and West Moors area has recently seen a considerable increase in rogue trader incidents. These range from offering gardening services to roof tile repair services. We would like to remind the local community not to engage with Doorstep traders, and to contact Dorset Police if you get suspicious traders at your door.


We are also still getting a number of scams reported to Dorset Police, these are mainly phone scams and computer scams. Please remember to never give out your bank details over the telephone, and do not engage with scams. There are plenty resources on the Dorset Police website and Action Fraud website, which explain the different types of scams and how to protect yourselves from them.

Furthermore, there have been a number of shed breaks in the area over the past few months. We would advise the local community not to keep high value items in garden shed and to install adequate crime prevention.

Crime Prevention:

We would like to remind the local community to lock their windows and doors, when they go out of their houses. We understand that people like to have their windows and doors open during this hot weather, to keep their homes cool. However, it is important to lock your windows and doors when you leave the house and do not leave your front doors open while out in the garden.

Furthermore, during the summer period Dorset Police sees an increase in Theft from Motor Vehicles, in some of Dorset's beauty spots. We would like to remind you to make sure your car doors are locked, when unattended and that you do not leave valuable in your cars. The local NPT increase patrols in local beauty spots and car parks, during the summer months. We will approach drivers if they leave their vehicles unlocked or valuables inside, to give advice regarding crime prevention.

Ferndown Community Office

The Office is located just inside the Barrington Centre and is open from 10:00-12:00 Monday to Saturday and is manned entirely by volunteers.

It has been in operation for almost 13 years and is the only one of its type in the south of England. The volunteers are supported mainly by subscriptions from the local Home Watches and a small income from the sale of various property and personal security products.

The volunteers are recruited through Dorset Police Volunteers Organisation and are fully vetted and carry appropriate I.D. Although it is a police organisation, the police play no role in day to day operation but there is considerable interaction between them and the volunteers, enabling information to be exchanged to the police and *vice versa*. Police Community Support Officers frequently drop by the office maintaining a very friendly and welcome relationship. The office and its dedicated supporters are part of a very substantial structure in Dorset of voluntary organisations delivering safety and security to the population. Collectively and individually they contribute enormously to the well-being of our residents.

The office was originally funded by East Dorset District Council (EDDC) and was a facility mainly used for residents to pay their rates, but it was closed. When the town police station also closed, there was no one to complain to, so the Community Office was born in 2005. Initially the office was only open 1 day per week and typical problems included parking infringements and noisy neighbours, which were not issues for the police who have rather more pressing priorities. In such cases Environmental Health officers are better positioned to address the problems—and this is still true.

The Community Office plays a valuable role in advising people and pointing them in the right direction. Typical of the crimes that volunteers were aware of (with their Home Watch hats on) were shed break ins. Typically a thief would break into a shed and use a shovel or similar implement to force patio doors open. It is not unusual for a shed to contain a crow bar and heavy hammers - a dream for a burglar. It was clear that sheds were often an unsecured treasure trove of garden tools, machinery, cycles and sporting equipment; all much easier to burgle than a house which was likely to be alarmed. So, what did they do about it?

In conjunction with Dorset Police Crime Prevention Panel and EDDC, **Sheducation** was launched. This was basically a horse box converted into a garden shed mock-up mounted on a trailer and stocked with affordable security products for sale along with information and advice intended to make sheds and outbuildings less vulnerable. The idea was conceived and driven forward by Brian Frecknall along with Roger Long and PC Tony Tester. The unit is towed by a vehicle to all sorts of events to advise the public of measures they can take to increase their home and personal safety by displaying and demonstrating items such as locks and burglar alarms.

It is worth noting that the shed can be booked by contacting Brian on w.frecknall@btopenworld.com. Brian is normally on duty in the Community Office on Wednesdays and has another role as Chairman of St Leonards and St Ives Home Watch. When not in use, the Shed is kept under cover at Ferndown HQ. Unfortunately, the police no longer have the resources to tow the trailer which must be carried out by a qualified and insured driver which limits its use. Currently it is operated using a council owned vehicle on a special request basis with Roger Long at the wheel.

Some of the products available both in the Office and Shed are:

Item	Description	Price
Card Defender	A wallet for your credit cards to prevent them being skimmed.	£0.50
Car Key Protector	To prevent a keyless car fob security system being hacked.	£3.00
Alarmed Padlock	If this lock is moved, it emits a loud alarm.	£11.00
Shed Alarm	A motion detector that can be installed in an enclosed space and emits a loud noise if it detects any movement.	£10.00
GuardCam	This motion detector device includes a HD camera that stores up to 60,000 colour photos or 750X20 second videos. It emits an audible warning that people who approach are being photographed, or it can be made to bark like a dog giving the impression that the premises are under guard. A floodlight illuminates the scene at night.	
Panic Alarm	A device with a loud alarm small enough to fit into a handbag.	£10.00

In 2006, attendance at the Office numbered 299 customers whilst in 2017 there were more than 2,800 customers-- and still growing! The Office is to be commended for the way in which it builds bonds with the local residents and helps them feel that they are actively part of policing the community. By channeling concerns and suggestions, it helps the police to build a better picture of local activity and make our neighbourhoods a better place to live, work and socialise in.
